## **Catholic Studies Minor**

Requirements for the Minor: 6 courses completed over four (4) years

- **3 Foundational Courses:** one in philosophy, one in theology—both are (and fulfill) CORE courses. The third foundational course, CATH 296 (All Things Ignatian...), should (ideally) be taken within the first four semesters of a student's program. CATH 296 fulfills an LUC Engaged Learning requirement and is also a Theology elective.
- 3 Elective Courses: students can specialize in specific disciplines from an array of cross-listed courses, such as Theology, Philosophy, History, English, Classical Studies, Fine Arts, Political Science. These courses may overlap with CORE requirements.
- **NOTE:** no more than **two** (2) courses from a single academic discipline may count towards the minor, and • at least two courses must be taken at the 300-level.
- Capstone: Catholic Studies minors attend 3 capstone seminars in the second semester of their senior year to explore the relationship of the Catholic Intellectual tradition and their major field of study. They write a synthesizing paper and present or perform an aspect of it at the annual Catholic Studies Banquet in May.
