catholic studies minor

Requirements for the Minor: 6 courses taken over four (4) years

- **3 Foundational Courses:** one in philosophy, one in theology—both are (and fulfill) CORE courses. The third foundational course, CATH 296 (*All Things Ignatian*...), should be taken within the first four semesters of a student's program. CATH 296 fulfills an LUC Engaged Learning requirement and a (300 level) Theology elective.
- 3 Elective Courses: students can specialize in specific disciplines from an array of cross-listed courses, such as Theology, Philosophy, History, English, Classical Studies, Fine Arts, Political Science. These courses may overlap with CORE requirements.
- **NOTE:** no more than two courses from any single academic discipline may count towards the minor; at least two courses must be taken at the 300-level.
- Capstone: Catholic Studies minors attend 3 capstone seminars in the second semester of their senior year to explore the relationship of the Catholic Intellectual tradition and their major field of study. They write a synthesizing paper and present or perform an aspect of it at the annual Catholic Studies Banquet in May.

All of the courses are excellent, but two are particularly of interest next semester: THEO/ENGL 383 with the great Greg Wolfe (editor of Image magazine; and of course the Ramonat Seminar—which is always superb. You must apply to Ramonat (students get a \$500 research stipend and CS Minors usually get excellent consideration).
