LUC WRITING CENTER – "ABOUT ADJECTIVES"

Adjectives are parts of speech modifying, or giving more information about, nouns. Whereas a noun refers to a person, place, or thing, adjectives describe the person, place, or thing being discussed, and usually appear in front of nouns. Remember that adjectives can describe all sensory information such as color, temperature, and appearance. They tell you how something looks, how it tastes, smells, and feels. Adjectives give you further details about what is happening in a situation.

Consider the difference between the following sentences:

- 1. Look, an animal is walking this way!
- 2. Look, a ferocious, wild animal is walking this way!

After hearing the first sentence, you might not be alarmed, or especially nervous that an animal of some kind was coming towards you. But once you hear about *the ferocious*, *wild nature or appearance* of the animal, you obviously would feel more concern for your safety.

- a) Find the difference between the following sentences by underlining the adjectives:
 - 1. During my drive this morning I was blinded by the sun.
 - 2. During my long, lonely drive this spring morning I was blinded by the burning, yellow sun.

Questions: Which sentence contains more descriptive information about the nouns (drive) (morning) (sun)? Do the adjectives help you understand more about the action that occurred in the more descriptive sentence?

Article Usage Tips: If your adjective begins with a **vowel** sound, you need to use the article "an" instead of "a." If your adjective begins with a **consonant**, you need to use the article "a" instead of "an."¹
